Sarah Vaughan is back on Mercury! The four titles on this EP mark her return to the label and were studiorecorded in Copenhagen August 7th 1963, when "the divine Sarah" was the top-attraction at the Tivoli Variety. As you may hear for yourself, Sarah did a wonderful job with Quincy Jones that day in the studio – just as she did at the Tivoli Variety. After her opening night there the press wrote:

SARAH VAUGHAN – MARVELLOUS VOICE, WONDERFUL GIRL

In a plain white dress she makes her entry. On stage no flamboyant gestures or exaggerated movements, just the sheer power and excliement of her singing captivates the audience . . . Miss Yaughan will not only attract all jazz lovers to the Tivoli, but also those who wish to spend an enjoyable evening at this wonderful performance.
